By growing our employment support programing we are able to move persons with disabilities closer to full inclusion in our community and fill much needed job vacancies in Grand Forks.

When Development Homes, built the new addition a few years ago we left an unfinished second floor anticipating possible growth of our programing.

We soon began to realize that there was increasing demand for employees with disabilities supported by ACES.

The ACES program offers employment skill building focus, with pre-employment skills training in our technology and career center. The pre-employment skill building topics are

With a very low unemployment rate in Grand Forks, businesses continue to clamor for workers, particularly in the service and entry-level sectors. Just drive down any commercial street and you will see signs on most businesses seeking applicants.

It is also known that people with disabilities remain one of the most under-employed populations. So, what better idea than to train people up and provide the support they need to take their rightful place in the workforce! At DHI, we are gearing up to expand our employment supports to more people, and to consequently fill more of the community need.

The benefits of employment to the individual are limitless. While many people we serve have their very basic needs met by public-funded programs like Social Security, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), and Medical Assistance, the additional income from a job can make all the difference. It can lift a person out of total financial dependence, and allow a better quality of life and the ability to take part in community activities.
